

While gangs are creating havoc in Port-au-Prince, committing rapes and kidnappings daily, the U.S. government does nothing to stop the flow of guns from South Florida that fuel the violence. Gangs have taken over 80 percent of the city and 200,000 people are displaced. **But**, on “the forgotten island” of *Lagonav*, there is still a **beacon of Hope, shining bright**, every single day.

The Matènwa Community Learning Center (MCLC) continues to **spread quality education**. Our goals are being accomplished. MCLC **IS changing** the practices of severe corporal punishment and verbal humiliation to **nonviolent discipline and positive reinforcement**; **IT IS changing** recitation of old textbooks in a foreign language to **reading and writing about students’ own lived experiences in their mother tongue**; **IT IS changing** the division of labor by gender to **embracing the equal capacities of both boys and girls**; and **IT IS changing** the belittling of farming that has resulted in increased hunger to the **practicing of organic farming in schools that results in increased food security**.

Your gifts are not in vain. **We are educating the next generation of leaders**. These students are working hard to realize the **2030 Sustainable Development Goals for their community**.

Football Championship 2023: We Are The Champions!

In April 2023, MCLC participated in a football championship with eight schools. In the first match, MCLC defeated the Wesleyan School of Plenn Mapou 7 to 1. In the second match, MCLC beat the Orthodox High School of Nan Kafe 1 to 0, and in the third match, we were 0 to 0 with the Nazarene School of Zetwa. In the final match of the championship, we went into overtime. **We won by a penalty kick 5 to 4. We were the champions!** In total, we scored eight goals in the championship and conceded only one goal because goals from penalty kicks do not count in the four games we played.



Water is Life!



My name is Beatrice Dessin. I would like to thank MCLC for helping me get a water catchment system so that I can catch rainwater now and plant a garden. This really helps my family a lot. Not only do we get water for our garden, but also water to cook with too. I planted 80 hot pepper plants, 20 heads of cabbage, 45 pepper plants, and 42 calalou plants. I have 45 pepper plants that are already bearing fruit and I have already harvested them twice! **I have already earned 6850 goud (\$50 US) selling my vegetables.** If all parents in the community had the ability to collect water like my family does, we would not be so dependent on importing food from the mainland.

Weekend Food Kits!

A note from Abner: "We were very happy when Friends of Matènwa gave us the means to give out food kits to the MCLC parents so that they were able to help the students have a meal on the weekends. **We distributed 200 food kits in May and again in July.** The parents were very happy. We all felt your compassion. Thank you."



The Dream Team

My name is Vana Lousine Edmond. I am the head of the Institute, which is a branch within MCLC that manages teacher training in the institution. **The vision of this group is to improve the education system by training teachers and school principals to provide a quality education in our mother tongue.** We have already done training for almost 100 schools on Lagonav with about 500 teachers and 95 school directors, not including well over a dozen other schools on the mainland that have come over for weeklong training. The Institute receives many requests from schools on the island to be trained, but **we often cannot respond to these schools, because we do not have enough means.** We are asking anyone reading this newsletter, if you want to help children in Haiti, please help us find the funds to be able to provide training to these schools. **We hope by 2030 that all 207 elementary schools on the island are implementing MCLC's principles of nonviolence, teaching in Creole, and achieving 100 % student participation.** Much love to everyone reading this newsletter.



I am Ednot Obel, I am the director of MCLC. There are many things that motivate me in my work as director. First, MCLC provides the opportunity for everyone to receive a quality, nonviolent education based on dialogue and respect for one another. MCLC promotes equality of women and men and does not tolerate discrimination. We provide opportunities and materials for children to learn and a breakfast using local food every day to support student learning and creativity. My vision for the future is to help further the mission and vision of MCLC; for the school to be stronger in reading and writing; to have 100 percent student success on official exams; and to continue to be a teaching school and a model for the future. **I want to work towards ensuring that every student who graduates from MCLC can live with independence and dignity.**



Most recently we worked with the elementary staff to go over the Ministry of National Education's programs and progression guides for each grade. **We are helping our less-seasoned teachers** better understand how to use them. Knowing the expectations of what content to cover with their students each week in each subject helps teachers better prepare their lessons and ensure continuity from week to week.

MCLC Directors: Delson Angerville, Ednot Obel, Vana Edmond and Abner Sauveur. We directors are working to **help each employee take on the responsibilities** described in their contracts in support of the mission and vision of MCLC. To accomplish this we provide monthly teacher professional development.



For high school staff we are **working on time management and class preparation.** We remind them of the importance of getting to their class 15 minutes before they are supposed to begin teaching, because, if you don't come prepared and have your materials ready, then you will waste class time. This will then cut into the amount of time that students should be getting for each subject. For seventh to ninth graders the requirement is six hours of instruction per day, and for grades 10-13 the requirement is seven hours per day.

Today I am one of fewer than 10 Haitian-born engineers at Google.



Breakfast Program



\$30/month gives a student DAILY BREAKFAST

Our Breakfast Program is key to students' stellar academic performance. Daily breakfast decreases absenteeism, reduces dropout rates, and promotes a happy and healthy learning environment. **By giving MONTHLY, you GUARANTEE one child can count on a meal every single day!**

Literacy Kits



\$75 funds MATERIALS to develop one kit

School materials should be available to all children because hands on learning is proven to be more effective than rote memorization. **\$75 helps us develop and distribute literacy and math activity kits** so that students can explore and remain engaged when learning in the classroom and at home.

Elementary Education



\$100/month covers EDUCATION for ONE

Join a Class Giving Circle. Many Haitian children experience being refused entry into their school whenever their parent cannot pay their monthly tuition on time. **Give a child the security of knowing that they will be able to attend school month after month, year after year,** without traumatic interruptions.

Local Business Training



\$1,000 launches a local START-UP business

Anisha Atluri had a vision to help the people of Matènwa, especially women, improve their capacity to run their own businesses. **Support MCLC's Post-Grad and Entrepreneur Program through the Anisha Atluri Entrepreneurial Fund,** which continues her generosity to budding entrepreneurs.

Creole Libraries



\$2,500 funds 25 new CREOLE TITLES

Our students learn to read through writing personal and class stories. Our goal, each year, is to create and publish new student-authored trilingual Mother Tongue Book titles (@\$100/title) and then reproduce and distribute 5,000 copies for \$15K (@\$3/copy) to partner schools on *Lagonav*.

Vegetable Gardens



\$6,000 gives WATER to 10 FAMILIES

We address food insecurity by relying on **agriculture-led initiatives to increase access to nutrient rich food.** Our water chateaus for family gardens combat long drought seasons. Local production helps *Lagonav* gain independence relying less on the mainland's unstable food source.

Matènwa Methodology



\$12,000 TRAINS a partner school for one year

Our Institute of Learning transforms schools using the Matènwa Methodology. Directors and teachers want their schools to become thriving centers of education like MCLC, but lack the resources. Help one school on the island give its students a **quality, non-violent, mother tongue education.**

University Scholarships



\$18,000 covers a graduate's four-year SCHOLARSHIP

Before our **SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM**, due to lack of resources, students' chances of attending university were slim to none. Presently we are helping 5 university students. These scholarships help **students break poverty-imposed barriers and build brighter futures.**
